Sewing Days From Alice Dayhoff-Miller

Sewing Days start Sunday, January 19, 1:00 at the Gathering House. Do you borrow clothing from GRCHA every year, need to update your clothing style from late 1700s to the Regency / Federalist era, or just wish to sit and sew with friends? This is the place to start.

They will continue every 3rd Sunday until June-other dates are: Feb. 16, March 15, April 19, May 17, and June 21.

If there is inclement weather in January or February, if there are counties with level 1 emergencies, or if a number of places / churches close we will cancel for that month.

Brings questions, thoughts, or sewing projects (projects do not need to the Fair related if you just need the space or wish to just sit with others sewing your project). I will bring the patterns I use, clothing I have made, and some samples of other fabric available. It would be great if others would bring patterns they have used, clothing you wear, and fabric samples.

Lemonade and water will be available. Bring a snack to share if you wish. The Gathering House is on New Boston Road within Clark Park where the Fair is held.

Reduce, Reuse, Recycle From Donna Lewis

Do you ever see trash thrown out in the park or along the roadway and think, "What is up with all of this trash?" It is one of my biggest pet peeves. What would our forefathers have said about how we trash the very land we live on? This past fall, the Wetland Warrior kids started cleaning up in and around the Mad River, at our Spangler Nature Preserve site. We could not believe all of the garbage: cans, plastic bottles, glass, tires, toys, socks, fishing poles, and even a toilet! The kids did a great job of cleaning up the site in September and returned again in October. They have decided to adopt this area and to help keep it cleaned up all year long.

REDUCE, REUSE, RECYCLE...that's the message for this winter. If each person does just one small thing to help, we can really make a difference. A lot of garbage gets into our rivers, forests, farms, yards, and into our parks. This garbage gets hidden over winter by the snow, then rears its ugly head again when the snow melts and spring arrives. The garbage can really trash the habitat in which wildlife live. It causes real problems for wildlife as some of them get caught in it (6- pack rings or fishing line) and some ingest the small plastic caps and other debris.

This winter, know the 3 "R's" and help out your own community.

- 1) Reduce the amount of garbage that you put into the waste stream. Buy things with less packaging, make your own food, and find other ways to minimize. Using reusable containers instead of baggies not only saves money but reduces waste. Get a plastic microwave cover instead of using paper towels to cover your food. We love it at my house!
- 2) Reuse containers after use. Your kids can make some great crafts out of things such as soup cans, boxes, toilet paper rolls, and much more. Search Pinterest for ideas! I love to use old spice containers for beads and other small items that I use for crafts.
- 3) Recycle your products before throwing them away. Know what your community recycles and look at the bottom to see if that item can be

recycled. Try to purchase products made from recyclable containers as well.

Please help GRHCA and the Clark County Park District by helping to keep our parks clean this year! If we all work together, we can make a huge difference for our community, its people, and the wildlife that live there. A big thanks to our Clark Park Hikers who help to pick up garbage along our trails each Thursday morning!
