Tintypes from the Corp of 18th Century Reenactors/Columbia Society's visit to the Crabill Homestead

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Coumbia Society At The Crabill Homestead

Part of Becky Bostick's Crabill Report

Last week, the Columbia Society presented a private immersion event for civilian living historians to recreate life as it would have been lived in the fall of 1863 at the Crabill Homestead. For five days, they lived in the house and participated in common daily activities of the time period.

Their first full day they butchered four hens. The meat was eaten at dinner time (served promptly at 3 PM as was proper). The next day was the main event. A heritage breed hog, expertly raised on one participant's farm in Tennessee was butchered as would have been in the time period. The hams and shoulders were hung in the cellar to keep cool. The chops, roasts, and pork belly were set aside for meals. The ribs were hung by the fireplace to smoke. Fat was separated to render into lard. The rest of the meat was chopped for sausage or salt pork.

The next day, they hand stuffed the sausage. The ribs were eaten for dinner, along with chicken left over from the day before. They baked things like bread pudding and onion custard in the outside bake oven. All the recipes used for meals were made from historical cookbooks such as *The Kentucky Housewife*.

On the last full day, they were visited by a traveling photographer who took tintypes of the participants. This was a common occurrence in the 1860s. The weather was particularly sunny and warm, unprecedented for a November day, but they took advantage of it and had one final picnic in front of the house to celebrate. It was a beautiful weekend, a lot of experience was gained, and the setting of the Crabill Homestead made it all the more perfect.
